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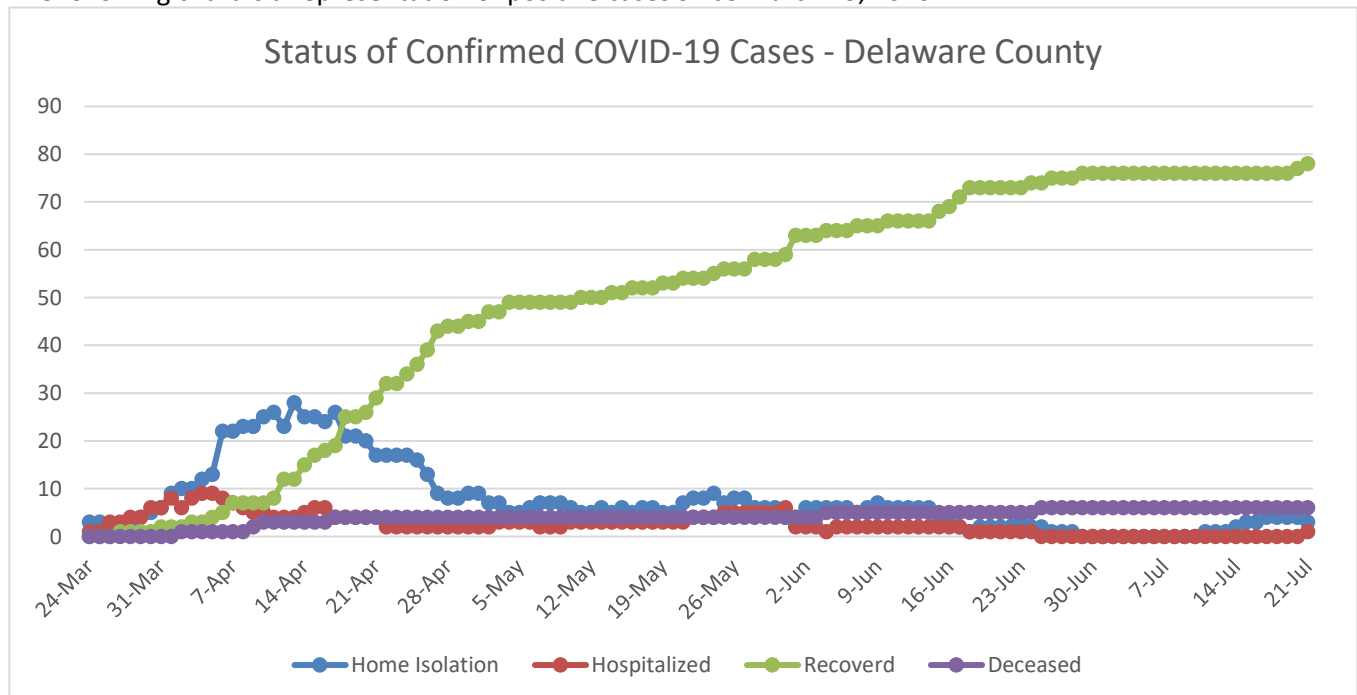

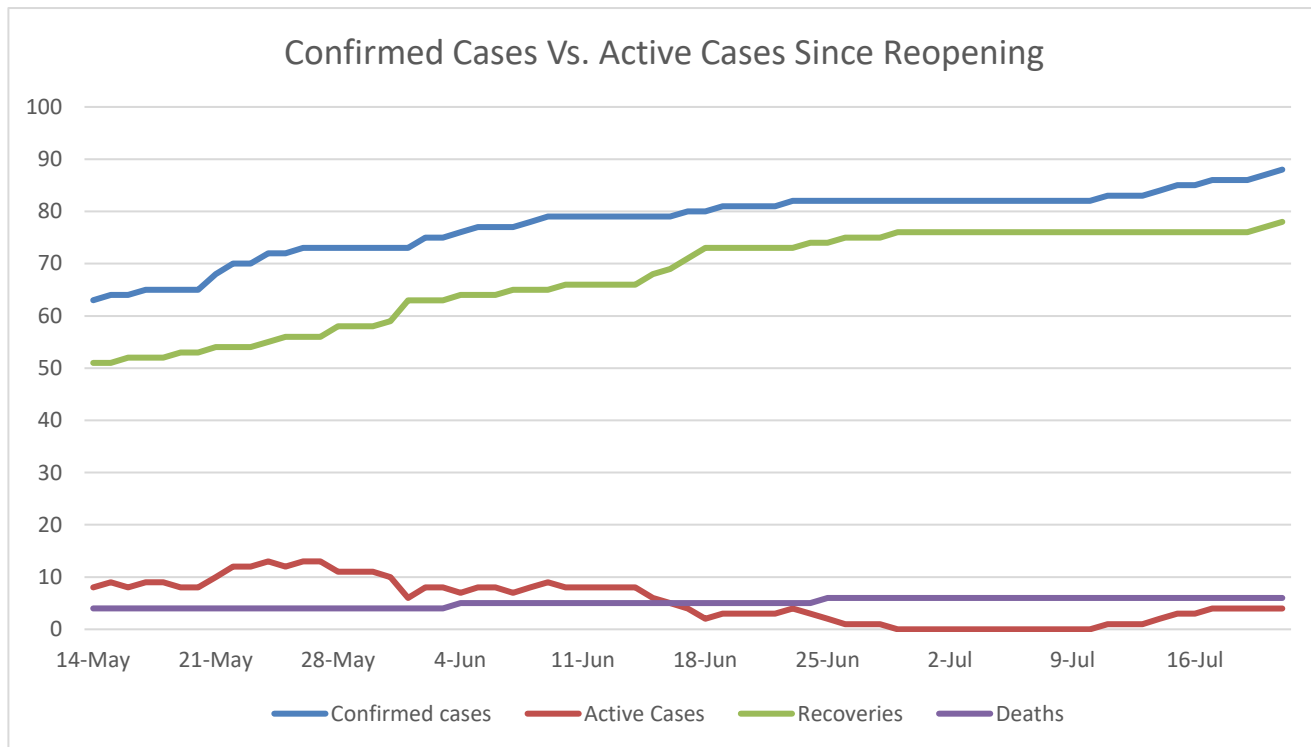
Governor Cuomo continues to stress the importance of social distancing. He has developed standards for restaurants and bars that requires they provide food in accordance with their liquor license and encourage patrons to sit at tables or the bar for consumption. The intent of these standards is to promote social distancing and discourage large gatherings around the bar. It is important to respect these standards while patronizing your favorite bars and restaurants so they can stay open and not jeopardize their liquor license. Citizens who see violations or are concerned can report complaints, including photos, to the State Liquor Authority at www.sla.ny.gov.

Delaware County received one new case of COVID-19 today and is reporting one additional recovery. The known active cases in the County remains 4. It is important to continue to use face coverings and practice good social distancing. Our economy can only remain open as long as we continue to comply with these directives county-wide. To date there have been 88 confirmed positive cases of COVID-19 in Delaware County, with 14 people under mandatory quarantine and 15 people under precautionary quarantine. There have been 4459 negative results reported and are 24 pending test results. As of today 3 people are isolated and receiving care at home and one is isolated in the hospital, 6 people have died and 78 have fully recovered and are no longer isolated or receiving care.

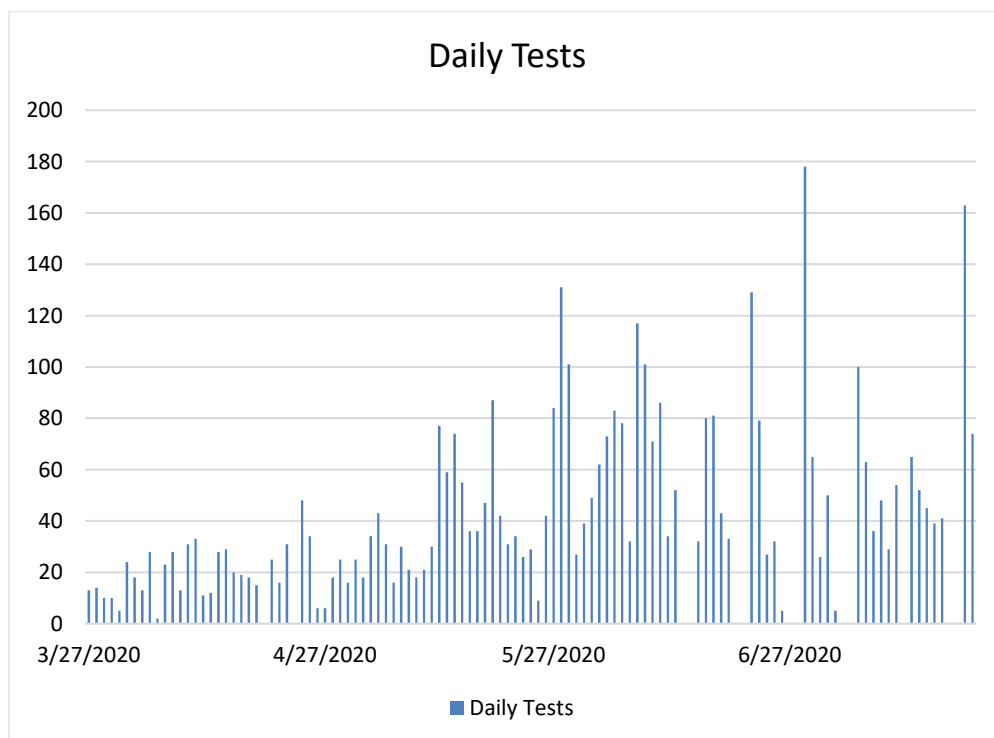
The following chart is a representation of positive cases since March 23, 2020.



The following chart represents the number of cases since the beginning of our economic reopening Phase 1 on May 15, 2020. The numbers have remained fairly consistent with confirmed cases and recoveries rising slowly, keeping the number of active cases and deaths flat from day to day.

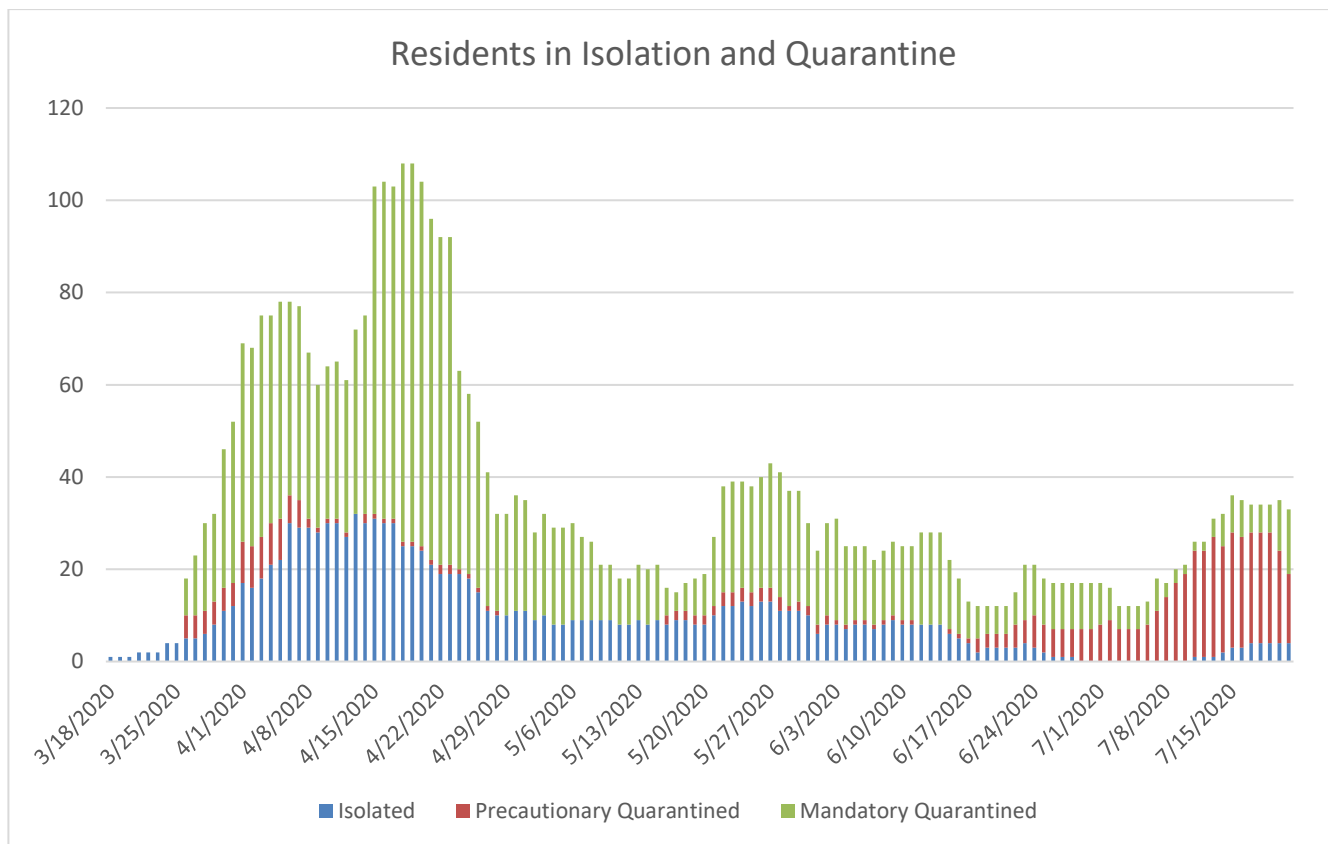


Delaware County remains vigilant in testing residents with 4593 people tested to date. Currently 10.2 % of the total population has been tested with test results being reported every day. The following chart represents the total number of new daily tests since March 26, 2020.

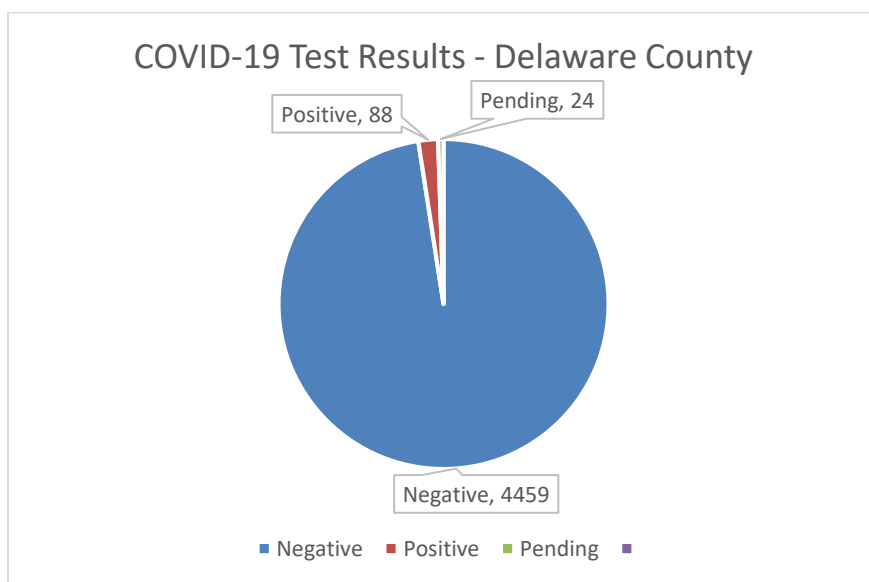


Another important measure that we need to be conscious of are the residents that have been placed under mandatory or precautionary quarantine.

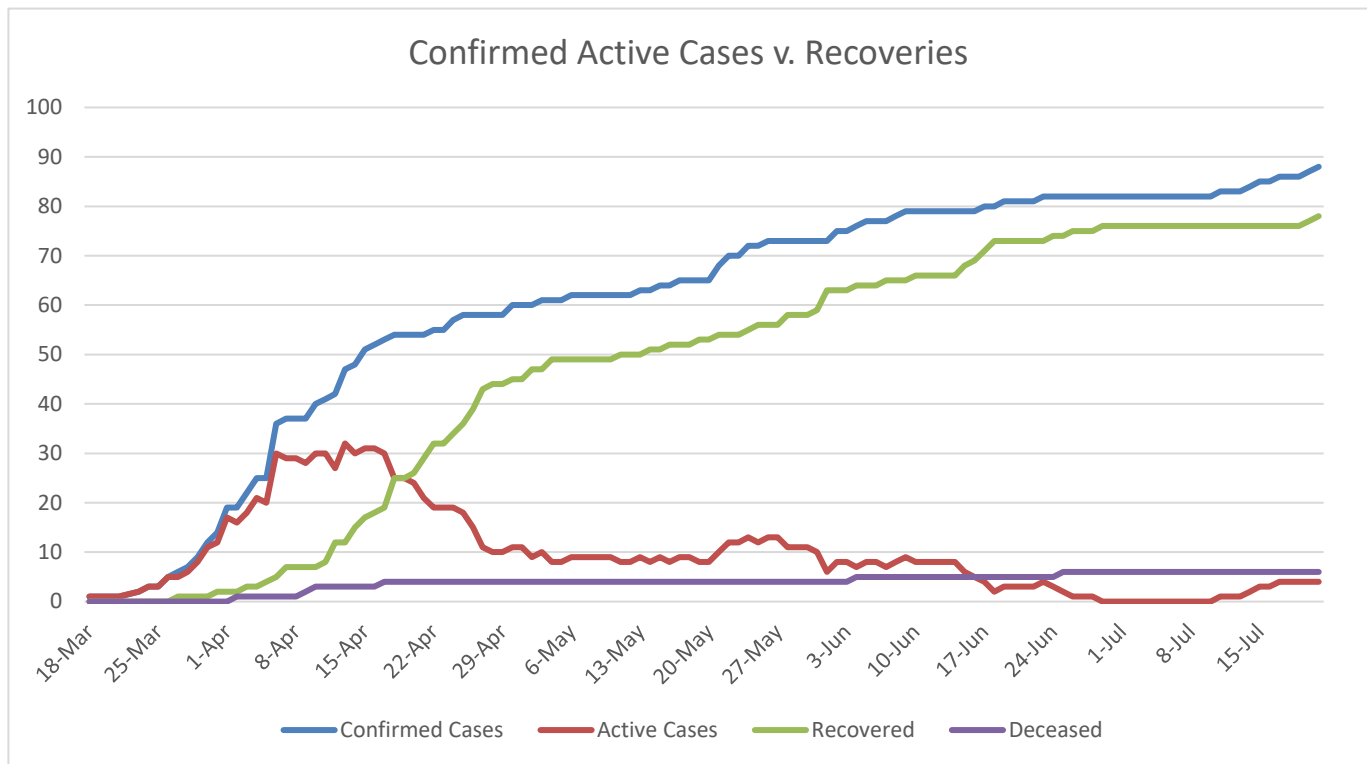
The following chart shows the number of residents quarantined and isolated.

The following chart represents the total number of confirmed cases in Delaware County in relationship to the number of those cases that have been discharged from care, deceased and active cases of the disease. The number of known active cases as of today is 4 and the number discharged is 78 while the number deceased is now 6.



As businesses have been reopening and more people begin to visit stores, restaurants and now places for entertainment please be aware of the state guidance and respect the business owner’s directives to wear face coverings and keep spacing between people. Businesses have gone to great lengths to comply with the State mandates and their ability to remain open is dependent on compliance.
